*An invasive plant is an alien (non-native) species whose introduction does or is likely to cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health. This is a photo of a typical Glossy Buckthorn infestation.



GLOSSY AND COMMON BUCKTHORN

Impacts:

- Creates dense thickets and out-competes native vegetation.
- Berries are very harmful to frogs and wildlife.
- · Drys out wetlands.
- · Host for a number of agricultural pests.

Suggested Control:

- If not treated with herbicide, buckthorn will profusely resprout after cutting.
- Harvest, bag, and destroy berries to reduce contamination.

CAUTION!

- Do not cut, mow or burn—this may stimulate plant growth.
- If not treated with herbicide, buckthorn will profusely resprout after cutting.
